SELF-HATE

By Madeleine Francis

These two articles are published in a twenty page booklet which is available from Madeleine Francis, 37 Elm Bank Gardens, Barnes, London, S.W.13.

The book is published as a memorial to Patrick who fell to his death from the clifftops at Ramsgate, convinced he had made a failure of his life. Patrick's article is a passionate denunciation of the mental hospital in which he suffered - 'One might contend that there was something seriously wrong with a person who could stay more than three minutes inside Scalebor without becoming very disturbed, or screaming their heads off. That is why the quietness of the patients is so false: the wards are ringing with silent screams.'

Madeleine's article is a lucid exposition of the value of self-hate, of the usefulness of accepting it in ourselves and respecting it in others. 'Self-hate will only get worse and more powerful if attempts are made to suppress or destroy it - it has to be befriended.' Even some psychiatrists do not realise this sufficiently and tend to try and persuade their patients that they must replace self-hate by self-love. Which makes the self-hate worse because it is not acceptable. And it is the sudden 26

bursting out, after a long period of repression, of self-hate that often leads to suicide.
