

The book does contain some classics, which have been reprinted before: Jourard's chapter from *'Disclosing Man to Himself'*; Rogers' *'A Humanistic Conception of Man'*; Maslow's *'Questions for the Normative Social Psychologist'*; the Skinner-Rogers debate on the control of human behaviour; and the Tannenbaum and Davis paper *'Values, Man and Organisations'* which gives a good outline of what Organisation Development is all about. Most of the chapters are reprints of one kind and another.

A serious defect, in a book of this kind, is that it has no index. This is very hard to justify in what is basically an academic book, addressed to the serious student. But for me, it is worth the money for Allen Wheelis' article alone.
