

Dear Vivian Milroy,

As editor of Counselling I must strongly object to the claim in your editorial (Vol.XIV No.4) that Counselling was unwilling to print opposing points of view to my article on the Self Awareness Movement.

In a letter to me dated 27th May you say 'John Rowan has sent me his reply to your critique on the self awareness movement and has told me that you thought that this would be perhaps more suited to Self and Society .than Counselling' (my emphasis).

The reasons for this have always been clear and I have expressed them to Rowan on more than one Firstly, our editorial occasion. board policy has long been to avoid devoting issues to parti cular themes, or academic debates of the kind: Smiths' reply to Jones, Jones' rebuttal to Smith etc. The editorial board view was, and still is, that Counselling as the Journal of the British Association for Counselling, represents the interests of all the various BAC divisions. Secondly, and because we were keen that the material be printed somehow we had discussed the possibility of a 'special issue' (incorporating Scott, Rowan and Franklands' articles). In that

respect however we were constrained by a BAC Executive decision that no special projects be initiated without up front funding. (Our recent efforts to put together a special issue on 'Counselling through the Media' have met the same obstacle).

It was against this background that I wrote to you on June 8th. In that letter I said I was happy for you to reprint my article and suggested that **Self and Society** might be interested in printing the three articles together. This hardly seems the act of someone unwilling to print opposing points of view.
