Angela Neustatter (The Guardian, 12 January) wrote a well researched piece on Relate (until 1988 the National Marriage Guidance Council). First person accounts of what it is like to have couples counselling that is a failure, even a disaster, were given alongside accounts of successful and enjoyable experiences. This seems to reflect the reality of this type of

work which, as she pointed out, is often a last resort for relationships that have reached the point of breakdown. Description of the size and scope of Relate included some sensitive statements about the very real management difficulties and differences of opinion to which Relate, like other counselling organisations, are prone.
